Report of the Beauty Parlor Survey

The results of this year's Beauty Parlor survey proved to be very favorable. Two types of questionnaires were sent out, one to those who use the Beauty Parlor and one to those who do not use it. Out of the ninety-eight people, (Twenty-four faculty and staff and seventy-four students), who were sent the first type, fifty-seven answered, and out of the forty people, (ten faculty and staff and thirty students) who were sent the second type, fourteen answered.

Twenty out of the fifty-seven who use the Beauty Parlor go occasionally, fifteen every other week, and twenty-two once a week. Everybody considers the hours convenient; everybody except four considers the quality of the work good or excellent, (these four say that it is fair); everybody except eight considers the hygienic conditions very satisfactory, (these eight say that it is satisfactory).

Nobody in the second group has reasons for not patronizing the Beauty Parlor other than that they never go to any beauty parlor either to save money or because they have short hair.

There were only four criticisms: 1. that sometimes hair is cut too short, 2. that appointments are broken too often, 3. that Laura's hours are too long for her to give the best of her ability, (this person always has her hair done at the end of the day), 4. that more time should be allowed to each person for a thorough brushing and a manicure. All other comments were very favorable.

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
