The American Friends Service Committee, Peace Education Program, is conducting a pilot project in New York. Four or more interns will work in specific communities, with their base in New York City. They will divide their time between study of war/peace issues and work in the community, with local religious, civic, labor, political and other groups to reinforce working in peace, and to afford and encourage individuals and new groups to work constructively for peace. The salary is \$4200 per year with fringe benefits. They are looking for candidates who are college graduates and who have had some formal study in international relations, who consider themselves pacifists.

Dr. Martin Koln, of the William Alanson White Institute of Psychiatry, in New York City, has N.I.M.H. Grant to study and evaluate children in day care centers and kindergartens. He wants classroom observers. To begin now or in September. Weekly salary offered is \$80.
