Writer speaks on self and stability at college

Matching this spring's calmer have been circulated thus fa climate of academic endeavor at Bennington College, writer Anais Nin spoke briefly and quietly Friday evening, under a marquee on Commons Lawn, on the necessity of looking to the "self" and of finding there "a place of stability in an unstable world."

Originally from Paris but considered an American writer, Anais Nin is best known for her Diary, of which a first volume was published by Harcourt in 1966. The Diary is actually contained in more than 150 notebooks, which Miss Nin keeps in a vault in a Brooklyn bank. She is now in the process of editing them, and three volumes covering her life from 1931 to 1944
