Their residence at the College, from September 14 to 21, will include two public performances beginning tonight, and again on Thursday, September 20, at 8:00 p.m. Billed as "Russian Vaudeville," these performances will each present separate material from the company's repertory. The Theater Salon is dedicated to producing little-known, forgotten, or once-forbidden Russian plays, stories, and poems. Their repertory includes Lermontov's "Two Brothers," produced in the manner of the forgotten romantic theater; a "Russian Vaudeville," rekindling the charm, humor, and music of this classic theatrical form; and a concert of traditional and romantic Russian songs.
