Dear Lewis.

Here are the suggestions that I have to offer in connection with basic courses in art.

I feel that great emphasis should be put on organization of form as I think that is important to creating or appreciating any work of art whether it is painting sculpture or architecture - I feel that this understanding can be brought about (to some extent) by the study of certain simple forms and combinations of these forms - I spoke to you about the way in which I feel this could be presented to students and I will not repeat it here as I think the main purpose of the course is what you are most interested in. The course that I have in mind should be taken by all students interested in art - whether it is from the standpoint of doing it or seeing it - in this way each will have a certain understanding of what the aim is. When this work is completed the student interested in becoming a producer of art will further perfect her self in techniques and can specialize in any field of art that

She may choose - the non major can drop studio at this point (if she so desires) and continue to read about art - and to apply what she has learned to appreciating and understanding the art that she sees.

I think that your suggestion of some theory be taken along with the studio offering the basic course is a good one and should certainly be given.

I hope these suggestions will be of some help - as I told you my whole desire is to work out something effective in bringing about a better understanding between those producing art and those who see it. This whole idea of mine may be cockeyed I frankly don't know whether it is or not -
