FROM THE HEALTH SERVICE

Will all students who had operations, illnesses, fractures or other interesting medical experiences this winter, please report these to the Health Service.

We have reason to suppose that some cases of contagious disease will occur this semester. North Bennington is full of measles. German measles, mumps and chicken pox are also occurring in the area. Because measles starts like any ordinary cold with a runny nose, slight cough, etc., please report these symptoms to us promptly. We may be able to prevent an epidemic if we can differentiate between the colds and the incipient measles. We will not put you to bed or isolate you unless you have the measles. Anyone who knows she has had a definite exposure to measles or one of the other contagious diseases should also report to us so that we can give her specific information regarding possible symptoms. In the case of measles, we would hope to be able to modify the severity of the disease if we knew in time of your exposure.

There has been a rule in effect for many years regarding food being taken by students from the dining room to other students in the houses--students who feel "indisposed". This rule serves two purposes: 1) if a student is ill enough to stay away from a meal, the Health Service wants to know in order to a) care for her, and b) protect others from what may be measles, etc; 2) the dining room needs the dishes.

Under special circumstances, i.e. need to use crutches - permission to take a tray to a student is given by the Health Service. We also inform the dining halls of this permission.
