




THE EXECUTIVE ORDER Richard Nixon issued Executive Order 11490 in 1969, spelling out the responsibilities of all federal agencies following a nuclear attack. His successors have kept it up-to-date.



The most important thing to remember about a nuclear war is that it will not be the end of the world. Nothing gets in the way of responsible postnuclear attack planning like negative, unconstructive attitudes such as those found in literature like On the Beach, Yes, 130 million Americans might be dead, and another 32 million might be injured. But the remaining 61 million healthy survivors can rebuild the country and live long, productive lives if they use common sense and follow government guidelines.






MONEY AND SACRED DOCUMENTS
