COMMUNITY COMMITTEE MEETING, TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 11TH, 1941

The Community Council met in the Committee dining room Tuesday, November 11th. GUEST SITES AND OUT-OF-TOWN

Ann Mills brought to the attention of the Council the fact that some members of the Community have been very negligent about their out-of-town slips. It was noted that out-of-town slips were a convenience to the records office when they wished to reach a student who was away, therefore students should try to give more exact information as to where they expected to be while they were off campus, and if for any reason they found that they could not be back on time they should let the switchboard know by telegram just when they would be back. Ann Mills also told the council that people had been putting the names of their guests on the check-in slip instead of filling out a guest slip and taking it to the switchboard. This should be done as soon as possible after the guest arrives. There has also been some confusion about emergency slips. The Council was asked to tell the members of their houses that when an emergency slip was filled out both the house chairman of the lender and the borrowed should sign it. Then these should be given to Lucile Bloch, the secretary of the Central Committee.

FANS FOR THE LOUNGE

Mr. McCamy reported on what he had found out about some fans for ventilating the Lounge during a discussion period. He said that there were fans obtainable that would ventilate the room with a minimum of noise and he said that he would see Mr. Machorn and something would be done.

CAMPAGN FOR WAR ECONOMY AT BENNINGTON

There will be a special college week for the campaign as well as some skits to acquaint the college with the fact that there is a drive to conserve these materials. Newspaper and tinfoil were two things that people are beginning to collect already.
