Madame Genevieve Tabouis, disting-
uished French journalist and refugee
from arrest in German-occupied France,
is now American correspondent of the
London Daily Dispatch and of the
"Critica" of Buenos Aires, and is also
contributing frequently to American
magazines and periodicals. She is also
writing a syndicated column for the
Press Alliance which is distributed to
a number of leading American and Cana-
dian newspapers.

One of the few women who has at-
tained eminence as a journalist in
continental Europe and France's only
outstanding woman journalist, she has
scored scoop after scoop in the polit-
ical columns of "L'Oeuvre", the French
daily of which she was the political
editor. One of these was the expose
in 1935 of the Hoare-Laval plan for
the partition of Ethiopia, and another

the announcement in January 1937 that
German troops had landed in Spanish
Morocco - an article that gave away
Hitler's plans on the country and sent
the French fleet to the Morocco coast.

Mme. Tabouis studied and taught ar-
chaeology before she turned to jour-
nalism. At one of the early Geneva
conferences following the World War to
which she had gone as secretary and
assistant to her uncle, Jules Cambon,
she wrote some chatty articles for "La
Petite Girond", a famous French prov-
incial journal. They immediately at-
tracted attention and before long she
persuaded "L'Oeuvre" to let her con-
duct its foreign news department, a
position which she held until the fall
of France last summer. Just before the
French surrender Mme. Tabouis was war-
ned by friends to flee France and went
to England. She stayed there, lectur-
ing and writing, until the end of July
when she came to the United States.

Dr. Schade is a young biochemist
who received his PH.D. from Harvard a
few years ago and almost immediately
won recognition in the field of re-
search through his discovery of an en-
zyme system which simplified the pre-
paration of fine leathers for handbags
and gloves. He is now engaged in in-
dustrial research with a company which
manufactures numerous enzymes among
which are some used to keep chocolâtes
from exploding, and others to raise a
good head of foam on beer.
