## \*SCIENCE DIVISION LECTURE BY DR. JAN SAPP

The Science Division will present Dr. Jan Sapp, University of Massachusetts, who will give a lecture entitled, "Cooperation in Conflict: The Struggle for Scientific Authority and the Role of Symbiosis in Evolution," on Thursday, April 18, at 4:30 p.m., in Room 148 in Dickinson Science Building. Refreshments will be served. Dr. Sapp examines the social and political influences that shape the structure of scientific inquiry. He describes science as "a social activity whose outcome is constrained by, but not determined by, the inner logic of its subject matter." Recent books by Dr. Sapp include Beyond the Gene: Cytoplasmic Inheritance and the Stuggle for Authority in Genetics (1987) and Where the Truth Lies, an account of the work of Franz Moewus.
