It is highly advisable for all students to store with storage warehouses all property they cannot or choose not to take with them. Crawford & Wright and Ruskins are two reputable concerns in Bennington which will provide this service at reasonable rates.

Students may store things in cartons properly tagged in the student cages in the attics. Clothing and other
