Sven Birkerts Amy Hempel Thursday, June 14, 2007 7:00 pm

Sven Birkerts' newest book is *Reading Life: Books for the Ages*. His other books include *My Sky Blue Trades: Growing Up Counter in a Contrary Time, Readings,* and *The Gutenberg Elegies: The Fate of Reading in an Electronic Age*. Birkerts has received a Guggenheim Fellowship and was awarded a Lila Wallace/Readers Digest fellowship. He is the Editor of *Agni* magazine.

Amy Hempel's newest book, *The Collected Stories of Amy Hempel* was a finalist for the PEN/Faulkner Award and one of *The New York Times*' Ten Best Books of the Year. Hempel received a Guggenheim Fellowship and is currently a contributing editor to *Bomb* magazine.
