### \*BLACK MARIA FILM FESTIVAL

The annual international Black Maria Film and Video Festival takes place on Monday, March 21, at 8:00 p.m. in Tishman. The Festival is an exhibition of contemporary independent film and video, representing a body of new works resulting from an annual competition held by the Edison Media Arts Consortium, which has characterized the exhibit as consisting of "lyrical and visual works as well as exploratory, socially relevant and inventively eccentric pieces." The Festival's tour itinerary includes venues such as Chicago Art Institute, Boston Film/Videomakers Foundation, and The Smithsonian Institute.

### \*WISG MONDAY NIGHT VIDEO FESTIVAL

The Women's Issues Study Group will hold a three-part, three-month video festival—"How Far We've Come: A Look at Women's History"—during the spring term to examine women's history, sexual diversity, and women in the arts. Continuing the first series of the festival, Women in American Life will be shown on Monday, March 21 at 9:00 p.m. in the Upstairs Café. This five-part short-film series by M. Ruthsdotter and B. Eisenberg features over 700 historical photographs selected from dozens of photo archives throughout the country. Multicultural in scope, each video examines a particular period of U.S. history, covering daily experiences, work lives, and involvement with social issues of women from a wide variety of geographic, racial, and ethnic populations.

Jade Ngoc Quang Huynh will read from his memoir South Wind Changing on Tuesday, March 22 at 8:15 p.m. in Barn One. After escaping from a Vietnamese prison/work camp in 1977, Jade managed to reach the Leamsing Refugee Camp in Thailand and flew to the United States a year later. South Wind Changing is his first book. Jade is a 1988 graduate of Bennington College.
