Gordon Keensy proposed a motion to recind last week's motion stating, "To censor Jeff Sarnoff from receiving further appropriations of student government funds."

Passed ukanimously: 4.abstentions.

Tim Littlefield proposed a motion to delete the sections from the minutes dating May 22 and May 28 that focused on the censorship of funds to Jeff Sarnoff. 6 for; 8 opposed; 1 abstention.

Tim Littlefield proposed a motion recommending that car keys be taken £way from people that have used to an excess mind altering drugs and/or alchohol, and plan to drive.

Passed unanimously.

The possibility of putting in speed bumps along the College's roads was discussed. One person mentioned the reason speed bumps had not already been put in is they cause problems for snowplows. The matter is being examined by the Administration.

A Council member asked if it was possible to have the people who bartend stop serving someone who is obviously inebriated. It was commented that it was not fair to hold student bartenders responsible - it gets too hectic behind the bars. Tim Littlefield porposed a motion that Council should print up a statement to be distributed by the Treasurer when the floating bar money is issued that clearly states the responsibilities of the bartenders and that the Treasurer takes it upon her/himself to restress the leagal reponsibilities. 9 for; 4 abstentions.

Andrea Leselle proposed a motion that only beer and wine would be sold at the Friday night parties. 7 for: 6 against.

Howard Gross reported that it is possible for Studne t Council to purchase a wide screen video projector for approximately \$3000.00. Council would give \$1500.00 and four Divisions have pledged to put up the remaining half. It was stressed that the role of the Film Society would in no way be changed and their schedule would not be interfered with.

Howard Gross proposed a motion that \$1500.00 be allocated from next year's budget to purchase an Advent 10000-A 7 foot wide screen video projector. Passed unanimously; 1 abstention.

Howard Gross proposed a motion to allocate \$1000.00 out of next year's budget for a scholarship fund in memory of Caroline Osborne and Nina Zinsser.

Randy Witlicki proposed a motion to table the above motion until next year. 3 fcr; 7 against; 1 abstantion.

Final vote on motion originally proposed: 6 for; ~2 opposed; 3 abstentions.

Don Schatz proposed a motion to approve the tentative budget for next year. 9 for; 1 opposed; 1 abstention.

Don Schatz proposed a motion to wait one week before printing the Student Council minutes and that the Student Council must first approve the minutes, and the fist order of business of each meeting will be to discuss the preceding week's minutes. 9 for; 3 against.

Barry Horowitz read the new pet regulations. The Council voted on them: 11 for; 1 against.

Discussion continued on the problem of plagiarism; Mark Barnes moved that SEPC distribute to the community the appropriate section of the Faculty Handbook and that this be prefaced by a proposed statement from SEPC. Motion adopted: 11 for, 2 abstentions.

There was discussion on the purposes on the purposes and effectiveness of the short review forms, and SEPC generally agreed that these short review forms serve no specific purpose and that they are unnecessary. Leslie Veber therefore moved that the short forms be eliminated; Martha Ackerman seconded; the motion passed: 10 for, 1 opposed, 1 abstention.

The Forms Committee presented a rough draft of its proposal for a new version of the long faculty review forms. Discussion was tabled until next week.

Peter Beck reported on the results of the grades poll conducted by SEPC:

Class breakdowns showed only that a higher percentage of "older" students responded.

Major breakdowns were of no import, although six Science majors were in favor of Option 1, and only one Science major was in favor of Option 2

Twenty students specifically stated that they came to Bennington because there were no grades and/or that they would leave if grades were offered.

Of the 52 students selecting Option 2, three said that they themselves wished to go to graduate school and that they wanted grades for that purpose.

Feter also reported that FEFC had again discussed the grades issue and had reaffirmed its commitment to the College's present grading system.

Voting for next term's SEPC Chairperson will be held next week.
