Major breakdown were of no import, although six Science majors were in favor of Option 1, and only one Science major was in favor of Option 2

Tventy students specifically stated that they came to Bennington because there were no grades and/or that they would leave if grades vere offered.

Of the 52 students selecting Option 2, three said that they themselves wished to go to graduate school and that they wanted grades for that purpose.

Peter also reported that FEPC had again discussed the grades issue and had reaffirmed its commitment to the College's present grading system.
