On November 27, there will be a March on Washington for Peace in Vietnam which has been called by certain prominent Americans who are concerned about the implications of our foreign policy. These persons, not representative of any specific organizations, include: H. Stuart Hughes, Norman Thomas, Erich Fromm, Michael Harrington, John Hersey, James Farmer, Arthur Miller, Saul Bellow and others.

The purpose of this March is to demonstrate that there can and does exist in this country individual doubt concerning the validity of the reasoning behind the US involvement in South East Asia.

In the light of the Administration's criticism and easy dismissal of past protest, it is essential that the basis and extent of our concern and disagreement be demonstrated; that the legitimacy of our protest be recognized. As the official call states, "The tone of the March will be affirmative and creative. There will be no civil disobedience."

Copies of a circular stating the explicit purposes of the March will soon be distributed. Arrangements have been made for a bus which will leave Albany 11 p.m. Friday and will return at the same time on Saturday. Transportation arrangements will be made to Albany if people are interested. The total cost of the trip will be \$10.00. Because of limited space and time, commitments must be made by November 15.
