Attention Sophomores and Juniors interested in Science: A special civil service examination for a position called STUDENT AID TRAINEE will be given early in December. This classification is especially designed for undergraduate students who want to work in the physical science fields during summer vacations and college work terms. Most of the positions are in the vicinity of Washington. By passing this exam students would be available for jobs next summer and the Non-Resident Term of 1955. The salary begins at the rate of \$2750. a year. Applications are in the Non-Resident Term Office, also a more detailed description of the work. The closing date for filing applications is November 17th.
