SVEN BIRKERTS JILL MCCORKLE

Thursday, January 9 7:00 pm **Sven Birkerts**'s most recent books are *The Other Walk* and *Art of Time in Memoir: Then, Again*, He has received grants from the Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest Foundation and the Guggenheim Foundation. He was winner of the Citation for Excellence in Reviewing from the National Book Critics Circle. Birkerts has reviewed regularly for *The New York Times Book Review, The New Republic, Esquire, The Washington Post, The Atlantic, Mirabella, Parnassus, The Yale Review,* and other publications.

Jill McCorkle is the author of ten books—four story collections and six novels—five of which have been selected as *New York Times* Notable Books. Her latest novel, *Life After Life*. Two of the stories in *Going Away Shoes*, were included in the Best American Short Stories Series. She is the winner of the New England Book Award, the John Dos Passos Prize for Excellence in Literature, and the North Carolina Award for Literature.

Nathalie Handal is the author of numerous books, most recently *Poet in Andalucía, Love and Strange Horses,* and the landmark W.W. Norton anthology *Language for a New Century: Contemporary Poetry from the Middle East, Asia & Beyond.* Her work has appeared in numerous publications including *Vanity Fair, Guernica Magazine*, the *Guardian*, and the *Nation*. Handal is a Lannan Foundation Fellow, winner of the Alejo Zuloaga Order in Literature 2011, and, among other honors, an Honored Finalist for the Gift of Freedom Award.

Alice Mattison's new novel, When We Argued All Night, was a New York Times Book Review Editor's Choice. Her story collection, In Case We're Separated, won the Connecticut Book Award for Fiction. Mattison's earlier novels include Nothing Is Quite

Forgotten in Brooklyn, The Wedding of the Two-Headed Woman, The Book Borrower, and Hilda and Pearl. She is the author of

three earlier story collections, and a collection of poems, Animals. Her work has appeared in The New Yorker, The New York Times, Ploughshares, The Threepenny Review and elsewhere, and has been reprinted in The Pushcart Prize, Best American Short Stories, and PEN/O.Henry Prize Stories. His book of connected personal essays, What Happens Next? Matters of Life and Death, was published in September 2013.

Joan Wickersham's most recent book, *The News from Spain: Seven Variations on a Love Story* was named one of 2012's best fiction picks by National Public Radio, *Kirkus Reviews* and *The San Francisco Chronicle*. Her memoir *The Suicide Index: Putting My Father's Death in Order* was a 2008 National Book Award Finalist. Her short fiction and essays have appeared in *The Best American Short Stories, The Best American Nonrequired Reading,* and many other publications. Wickersham writes a regular op-ed column for *The Boston*. She has been awarded grants by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Massachusetts Cultural Council.

Benjamin Anastas is the author of the novels *An Underachiever's Diary*, which has been called "the funniest, most underappreciated novel of the 90s," and *The Faithful Narrative of a Pastor's Disappearance*, which was a New York Times Notable Book. His memoir *Too Good To Be True*. Other work has appeared in *Harper's*, *The New York Times Magazine*, the *Paris Review, Tin House, GQ*, the *Yale Review, Bookforum*, and *The Best American Essays 2012*.

Wesley Brown is the author of three published novels, *Tragic Magic, Darktown Srutters, Push Comes to Shove* and three produced plays, *Boogie Woogie and Booker T, Life During Wartime, A Prophet Among Them.* He is the co-editor of the multicultural anthologies, *Imagining America* (fiction) and *Visions of America* (non-fiction) and editor of the *Teachers & Writers Guide to Frederick Douglass.* He also wrote the narration for a segment of the PBS documentary, *W.E.B. Dubois: A Biography in Four Voices.*

He is the recipient of a Whiting Writer's Award and has been awarded residencies at the MacDowell Colony, the Fine Arts Work Center, and Yaddo. His photographs and photo essays have appeared in *Poetry, The Massachusetts Review, Jubilat* and *Transition*.

Askold Melnyczuk has received a Lila Wallace Reader's Digest Grant in Fiction and a McGinnis Prize in Fiction. His first novel was a New York Times Notable, his second was an *LA Times Best Books of the Year* selection. He has received the Magid Prize from PEN for his work as founding editor of *Agni* and honored by AWP with the George Garret Award. His work has also appeared in *Glimmer Train, The Antioch Review, The Massachusetts Review, The Denver Quarterly. The Writer's Chronicle, The Nation, The New York Times, Ploughshares, The Boston Globe, and Grand Street.*

MAJOR JACKSON RACHEL PASTAN

Major Jackson is the author of three collections of poetry: *Holding Company*; *Hoops*, and *Leaving Saturn*. He has published poems and essays in *AGNI*, *American Poetry Review*, *Callaloo*, *The New Yorker*, *Poetry*, *Tin House*, and elsewhere. *Leaving Saturn* was awarded the Cave Canem Poetry Prize for a first book of poems and was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award. Jackson is a recipient of a Pushcart Prize, a Whiting Writers' Award and has been honored by the Pew Fellowship in the Arts and the Witter Bynner Foundation.

Rachel Pastan is the author of three novels: *Alena, Lady of the Snakes*, and *This Side of Married*. Her short fiction has been published in *The Georgia Review, The Threepenny Review, Mademoiselle, Prairie Schooner*, and elsewhere. A graduate of Harvard College and the Iowa Writers' Workshop, Rachel is currently Editor-at-Large at the Institute of Contemporary Art in Philadelphia, where she writes the blog *Miranda*.

She is a Guggenheim Fellow and a recipient of the Whiting Writers' Award.

David Gates is the author of the novels *Jernigan* and *Preston Falls*, and a collection of stories, *The Wonders of the Visible World*. Mr. Gates's fiction, articles, and reviews have been published in *The New Yorker, The New York Times Book Review, Esquire, Rolling Stone, Tin House, Bomb, Salon.com, The Oxford American, The Journal of Country Music, and frequently in Newsweek, where he was a longtime writer and editor. He's received a Guggenheim fellowship, and his books have been finalists for the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Critics' Circle Award.*

He has received fellowships from the NEA, the Wallace Stegner Fellowship Program at Stanford, and the Amy Lowell Trust. His poems, interviews, reviews and translations have appeared in journals such as *Slate*, *The Paris Review, Poetry, Yale Review, Fence* and *Tin House*.
