EXPERIMENT IN INTERNATIONAL LIVING, INC.

Spaces are still available in The Experiment all women's Italian Art Group sailing on the "Volendam" June 26th for Rotterdam. Four weeks will be spent living individually with families in Florence. During this month in Florence group members will spend five mornings a week in polishing Italian conversation. The group has been invited to work for ten days in a home for war orphans. The remaining time will be spent touring in northern Italy, in Venice, Rome and Padua and then to Paris.

Late Admission to Courses - Courses may be entered only during the first fifth of the sessions scheduled for the term. (During a normal 15 weeks term, the

deadline for entering courses meeting twice weekly would be after 6 sessions; for courses meeting once weekly, after 3 sessions; and so on.

Withdrawal from Courses - Courses may be dropped without injuring the student's record only during the first fifth of the sessions scheduled for the term. Courses dropped after this deadline stand as failures in the student's Bennington record and in transcripts of her record to other institutions.

Late Submission of Written Work - Written work considered essential to a student's accomplishment in a course which is submitted after the date on which it was due will be accepted only if the instructor so chooses.

Absence from Classes - Students are not expected to miss classes unless they have a legitimate reason and notify the faculty member concerned. When in his judgment absence makes it impossible for the student to meet the demands of the course, the student will be dropped, with consequent failure. Substitute assignments for work missed will be offered only at the instructor's option.

Granting of Incomplete - Students may request, but not elect, an Incomplete in a course. The decision is the instructor's. Incompletes will be granted when the work could not be completed through no fault of the student, (rare) when her work otherwise indicated that satisfactory completion of the course is probable and when the work can be completed by the next mid-term. "Incomplete" is not an extension of time to compensate for otherwise failing work. Incompletes may not be made up during the Non-Resident Term unless the normal obligations of that period can be met at the same time. Those Incompletes not made up by the next mid-term automatically are failures.

*Exceptions to any of these provisions shall be made at the discretion of the faculty member concerned.

AMERICAN VALUES PROGRAM

American Response to Crisis

Director: Daniel Aaron

On June 15, 1949, the Carnegie Corporation of New York granted a sum of money to Bennington College "toward development of a course in education for American values." The course described below, "American Response to Crisis", attempts to clarify the pervasive themes of the American tradition, and especially the goals and values which have operated in its growth. It will touch upon a variety of significant events and ideas—economic, political, and cultural—in American life and will single out for investigation and analysis those episodes in particular which bring into relief the role and operation of values in America. The proposed course, planned and organized by a committee of the Bennington faculty* offers an opportunity to work out an educational experiment original in its approach and, if successful, suitable for adoption in other colleges and universities.

"American Response to Crisis" is essentially an examination of fifteen crisis situations or turning points in American history with the purpose of determining how the American people, in groups or as a nation, have responded to them. The course will be constructed around a series of outside lectures, one for each crisis, which will continue at two-week intervals from September 18, 1950 through June 25, 1951. Every lecturer will meet with the class for further discussion the morning after he has delivered his lecture. During the intervening weeks, the class will meet with the director of the course and, on occasion, with various members of the Bennington faculty.
