#### Report of the Provost and Dean of the College

Isabel Roche reported:

• In the interest of time, Isabel informed faculty that an email will be sent at the end of the day with some additional announcements.

### **CAPA** highlights:

- This spring, there are 26 courses (not counting tutorials) and over 300 students studying and working in CAPA.
- We've also seen record turn-out this year in CAPA from members of the local community, thanks both to the strength of the topics and their importance in the world we live in today, as well as to the advent of the "This Week @ CAPA" newsletter, which delivers a more streamlined and consistent form of communication about the ongoing work taking place in CAPA. ## Susan Sgorbati also reported on CAPA:

- CAPA is very busy right now with important courses and projects. We continue the work in the public schools in Bennington. The whole 7th grade comes to visit us in CAPA every spring and was here on May 7th.
- o Robert Ransick has two new M.F.A. in Public Action candidates this fall.
- John Hultgren is continuing his work on the Consortium on Forced Migration,
  Displacement and Education with new curriculum development work over FWT. He will

- also be working on funding for migration and displacement, if you would like to participate, please speak with John.
- Judith Enck is working hard with students on her national campaign on Plastics
  Pollution. With the help of Senator Brian Campion, Vermont just passed the strictest law banning plastics than any other state in the country.
- Brian is working on adding a course in legislation next term with Eileen Scully where students will be interning in the Vermont Legislature, with the hope to expand to other legislatures in the country.
- o SCT faculty have met about developing peacebuilding curriculum in the future.
- Jonathan Pitcher (GANAS) has a new project that will provide professional training to license interpreters.
- Ann Pibal has a new course in political posters.
- Debbie Warnock continues working with 1st Generation students.
- Andrew Cencini will begin new prison courses this summer.
- Annabel Davis Goff continues to work on the Incarceration Reform and Prison Education.
- We have two guests in Human Rights and Peace Building: Andy Galindo and Vahidin Omanovic.
- Tim Schroeder and Janet Foley have continued the great work on the PFOA project.
- Marguerite Feitlowitz, who has been on sabbatical, continues to move the Bennington Translates work forward.
- The new "food" grant funded by the Mellon Foundation will embark on a three year focus on Food Insecurity in Bennington. A search for a 3 year visiting faculty member has just concluded. If you have any interest in combining food in your course curriculum, please contact Susan.

#### **Report of the College Steering Committee**

Vanessa Lyon, co-chair, reported:

- The committee has met with all discipline groups and compiled raw data that will be incorporated into the NECHE self-study. There was a lot of faculty participation.
- CSC is currently undergoing the revision of the Faculty Grievance Policy.
- The committee is further considering the role of CSC for the META review and will be working closely with the new Associate Dean to look at possible restructuring of the college discipline groups.
- They continue to work on general and mental student health support and faculty retention.

## Report of the President

Mariko Silver reported:

- This summer a group will be created including staff and faculty to discuss international students issues. This will be a task force with a limited time frame and an advisory group will be created from this for the long term planning.
- We now have a small emergency fund of 10k for international students to be used for health, family crisis, travel, etc. This doesn't need to be used only for travel expenses home. The fund will be divided into terms and will be given out on a first come, first served basis. This is something that causes major anxiety for students. In the next year or so we will be adding this benefit for domestic students as well.
- The Admissions report was presented by Tony Cabasco, the Alumni Relations report was presented by Matt Rizzo, and a presentation of Commons Opening/Barn Plans was given by Andy Schlatter.
- Reminder to fill out the Barn survey regarding plans for rebuilding the damaged wing. The faculty in the damaged offices will be moved into temporary spaces for the 19-20 academic year.
