Private student telephones. Any student who would like a phone-jack installed in his/her dorm room for this term must give her/his name and \$50 to the Business Office (see Janet Hanson) no later than March 18.

No requests for private student telephones will be honored after this date. We must hire an outside contractor to do the work and it will be necessary to do it all at one time.

Health Services. The Health Service is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. The Saturday and Sunday hours are 3 p.m. to 11 p.m., except on vacation weekends. Security should be called when the Infirmary is closed if emergency medical treatment is needed. The Health Service is staffed by four physicians. In addition to the Director, Nancy Scattergood, MD., and her associates Richard Barad, MD, and Edd Lyon, MD, a fourth physician, Barbara Raskin, MD has been added to the staff this term. Appointments with the doctor can be made by contacting the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary in person or at extension 220 or 285. If an appointment cannot be kept, the Health Service should be notified in advance.

During FWT the Commons Lounge has been refurbished with a new floor, and cleaned woodwork. New furniture has been ordered (tables and chairs) and will arrive in the next few weeks. Several canvases, painted by former Bennington students have been hung in the lounge.

A new lounge and television room has been created in the old Infirmary ward. Ping-pong tables will remain in the Commons lounge.

Everyone is requested not to post posters or notices on the lounge doors or its woodwork. Instead, the community is invited to use two bulletin boards--the Blue and the Red--which have been provided at the foot of the Dining Hall's stairs.

In an effort to preserve them, the Community is also requested to avoid--from now on--stapling, taping or thumbtacking notices on the

Commons and the Barn outer doors. Over time, the damage caused by such treatment causes serious problems.

Cashier's Office. The Cashier's Office will open Monday, March 4. The hours for cashing checks up to \$25 per day will be Monday - Friday - 11 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. - 4 p.m. Since so many students bounced checks last term, the following procedure will be strictly enforced:

If a student bounces a check, he or she will not be allowed to cash checks at the College for the remainder of the semester. In addition, the check must be validated as soon as possible, but no later than two weeks, or a note will be sent to parents for collection.
