SOCIAL SCIENCE
LECTURE

David Tobis is a graduate student at Yale in sociology and the husband of Risa Tobis, Bennington '69. Mr. Tobis took a trip this May to North Vietnam as a representative of the student movement in this country and at the invitation of the national student organization of North Vietnam. He took extensive photographs, some of which will be shown at this time.

STUDENT MEETINGS

Dr. Bernard Aaronson will conduct a workshop in which he will explore non-drug approaches to psychedelic experience. He will deal with the psychedelic implications of hypnotism and will also answer questions on psychedelic drugs, if any should be raised by the audience. Dr. Aaronson has been experimenting with hypnotism in an effort to find correlations among schizophrenia ("divine madness"), mysticism, and psychedelic states.
