The Vermont Children's Aid Society supplements and extends the child welfare services of the State Department of Public Welfare. It is supported soley by private contributions.

The Y.M.C.A. of Bennington affords the only adequate recreational vacilities in the district. Its activities include a wide variety of both garl's and boy's clubs. It is considered a necessary and worthwhile addition to the community.

The Shaftsbury Public Health Service was made possible by Munds raised in this community. It supplys a nurse and maintains a clinic for the North Bennington as well as the Shaftsbury area. Our financial assistance is absolutely necessary in order for it to continue its work.

The work of the Red Gross (local chapter) is of continued importance, as it affords general public health services to the entire county. This year, as the community's decision was to contribute to war relief as well as local charities, we are planning to ear-mark a part of the total Red Gross contribution for its international work.

The U.S.O. operates recreational and morale-building centers in the army camps, the navy stations, defence production centers and overseas bases. Their program was fouded on the principle that the government would build and equip the clubhouses if the public would supply the funds needed to operate them, and to carry on such activities as the Victory book campaign, camp shows, etc.

The Navy Relief Society supports the widows and children of navy men. In the past their slegan has been - "The Navy Tribet Gare of Its Own", but as the recent losses have been far greater than those during World War I and the Spanish War, they have found it necessary to ask for outside help.

The work of the American Friends Service Committee is carried on on an international scale. As its emphasis is non-belligerency it is able to do war relief work in all parts of the world.

Our calculations have been based on an average contribution of three dollars (03.00) from every person in the college community.
