

COLONIAL HOME

This lovely Early American Colonial home, formerly the residence of Robert Frost, America's beloved poet, is located in the heart of scenic Shaftsbury, Vermont. Built by highly skilled stone craftsmen in 1769, it is believed to be the oldest house still in existence in Shaftsbury.

GROUNDS:

Approximately 85 acres of land consisting of open fields bordered by berry patches, a variety of trees in large wooded areas and an apple orchard. Immediately surrounding the house are tall, lovely shade trees. A raised patio encompasses the rear area of the home.

HOUSE:

An unusual example of Colonial stone craftsmanship with dressed stone walls 22 inches thick, insures cool summers and snug winters. There is a full shed dormer to the rear of the home. Featured also is a fully enclosed porch across the rear of the house measuring 10' x 38' and is equipped with screens and storm windows.

FIRST FLOOR:

Large center entrance hall with coat closet. Front living room is 14' x 26' with native Vermont stone fireplace, natural old wood floors and exposed hand-hewn beams. Dining room is 13' 6'' x 16'.. Modern kitchen 10' x 22' with knotty pine cabinets and cupboards. Powder room directly off the kitchen.

SECOND FLOOR:

Stairway with original cherry handrail leads to spacious second floor hallway with wide board flooring. Two spacious master bedrooms 14' x 24' with large closets. The south bedroom has an additional built-in storage closet and drawers at the east end of the room. All new bath with seperate tub and stall shower. The linen closet is located in adjacent hall.

GARAGE: ^

Oversize detached garage with overhead door and side entrance.

BASEMENT:

Full basement with concrete floor and stone wall foundation. Outside hatchway. Dutch oven, used in the early days, and laundry is located in the basement.

HEATING PLANT:

Forced hot water heat. General Electric boiler, oil hot water which provides year 'round domestic hot water. Total annual fuel bill averages \$260.00

OTHER:

The house was completely restored in 1955 by one of the areas finest contractors. At that time a completely new roof of the best grade cedar shingles, all new wiring and copper plumbing was installed. The house was also completely capped with insulation down to the stone walls. Water is supplied by a 295' artesian well which delivers 5 gallons per minute. Sewerage includes a large septic tank and dry well. Anderson combination storm windows throughout.
