The exhibit of ceramics by potter Londa Weisman, '67 previously slated to appear at the Park-McCullough House in North Bennington in May, has been cancelled due to a conflict in the artist's schedule. No new date has been set.

On Sunday, April 15 at 3 p.m. at the Second Congregational Church on Hillside Street in Bennington "A Talk With David Dellinger". David Dellinger, a long-time peace activist, will be the fourth and final speaker in the Peace Resource Center's winter series of talks on current social issues. Dellinger will address "The Power of Peacemakers in the 1984 Election." He speaks from nearly 50 years of involvement in local and national organizing for peace and social justice which have included two prison terms. He received considerable national attention as a member of the much publicized Chicago Seven. However, much of his work has been as a writer, including sixteen years as editor and publisher of Liberation magazine. He was coordinator of the Vietnam Peace Parade committee; member of the Russell War Crimes Tribunal; and Chairman of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam.
