<b>Benjamin Anastas Jill McCorkle Thursday, January 10</b> 7:00 pm	<ul> <li>Benjamin Anastas is the author of the novels An Underachiever's Diary and The Faithful Narrative of a Pastor's Disappearance, which was a New York Times Notable Book. His memoir, Too Good To Be True, was published by in October of 2012. His essays, journalism, short fiction and reviews have appeared in Harper's, The New York Times Magazine, the Paris Review, Tin House, GQ, the Yale Review and Bookforum.</li> <li>Jill McCorkle is the author of ten books—four story collections and six novels—five of which have been selected as New York Times Notable Books. Her latest novel, Life After Life is due out in 2013. Two of the stories in Going Away Shoes, were included in the Best American Short Stories Series. She is the winner of the New England Book Award, the John Dos Passos Prize for Excellence in Literature, and the North Carolina Award for Literature.</li> </ul>

His first novel was a <i>New York Times Notable</i>, his second was an <i>LA Times Best Books of the Year</i> selection. He has received the Magid Prize from PEN for his work as founding editor of <i>Agni</i> was honored by AWP with the George Garret Award. His work has also appeared in <i>Glimmer Train, The Antioch Review, The Massachusetts Review, The Denver Quarterly. The Writer's Chronicle, The Nation, The New York Times, Ploughshares, The Boston Globe, and Grand Street.</i></li> <li>Brenda Shaughnessy's most recent collection of poetry is <i>Our Andromeda</i>. She's also the author of <i>Human Dark with Sugar</i>, winner of a James Laughlin Award, and <i>Interior with Sudden Joy</i>, finalist for the Lambda Literary Award. Shaughnessy is the recipient of a Bunting Fellowship, an NEA/Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission Fellowship, and a Howard Foundation Fellowship. He has published poems and essays in AGNI, American Poetry Review, Callaloo, The New Yorker, Poetry, Tin House, and elsewhere. Leaving Saturn was awarded the Cave Canem Poetry Prize for a first book of poems and was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award in poetry. Jackson is a recipient of a Pushcart Prize, a Whiting Writers' Award and has been honored by the Pew Fellowship in the Arts and the Witter Bynner Foundation in conjunction with the Library of Congress.</li> <li>Patricia Hampl's most recent books are the memoir, The Florist's Daughter, and another work of nonfiction, Blue Arabesque, both on many year-end "best" lists including the New York Times "100 Notable Books of the Year." Her first memoir, A Romantic Education and subsequent books established her as a leading voice in contemporary memoir. Her work has also appeared in The New Yorker, Paris Review, Best American Essays, Best American ShortStories, Granta, and The New York Times Book Review. In 1990 she was awarded a MacArthur Fellowship.</li> </ul>
David Daniel Alice Mattison Sunday, January 13 7:00 pm	<ul> <li>David Daniel's collections of poems include Seven Star Bird, for which he won the Levis Reading Prize; and his chapbook, The Quick and the Dead. Daniel recently completed a new collection, Ornaments and Other Assorted Love Songs. He is currently working on a new manuscript, American Recordings. He is a regular contributor to The American Poetry Review, and poems, essays and reviews have appeared elsewhere, including the Harvard Review, Agni, Post Road, Witness, Boston Review, and Ploughshares, where he served as the Poetry editor from 1992 to 2007.</li> <li>Alice Mattison's new novel, When We Argued All Night, was a New York Times Book Review Editor's Choice. Her story collection, In Case We're Separated, won the Connecticut Book Award for Fiction. Mattison's earlier novels include Nothing Is Quite Forgotten in Brooklyn, The Wedding of the Two-Headed Woman, The Book Borrower (a Times Notable Book), and Hilda and Pearl. She is the author of three earlier story collections, including Men Giving Money, Women Yelling, and a collection of poems, Animals. Her work has appeared in The New Yorker, The New York Times, Ploughshares, The Threepenny Review, Ecotone, and elsewhere, and has been reprinted in The Pushcart Prize, Best American Short Stories, and PEN/O.Henry Prize Stories.</li> </ul>

Hallman is the author of several books of nonfiction, including <i>The Chess Artist</i> and <i>In Utopia</i>, and a book of short stories, <i>The Hospital for Bad Poets</i>. In 2013, he will publish a short biographical work on the correspondence of William and Henry James, and in 2014 he will publish a literary relationship-memoir about author Nicholson Baker.</li> <li>Jim Shepard is the author of six novels, including most recently <i>Project X</i>, and four story collections, including most recently <i>Like You'd Understand, Anyway</i>, which was nominated for the National Book Award and won the Story Prize, and <i>You Think That's Bad</i>. His stories have been included in the <i>Best American, PEN/O.Henry</i>, and <i>Pushcart Prize</i> anthologies.</li> </ul>

He has received fellowships from the NEA, the Wallace Stegner Fellowship Program at Stanford, and the Amy Lowell Trust.
