*PERSIAN GULF CRISIS: A LECTURE BY HELENA COBBAN The Social Sciences Division presents a lecture by Helena Cobban: "Persian Gulf Crisis: Oil, Money, Arms, and the Pursuit of Security." Helena Cobban is a graduate of Oxford University who has worked as a Middle East correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor and the London Sunday Times. Her analytic commentaries have appeared in a variety of publications, including the New York Times, the Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Foreign Affairs, and Foreign Policy.

Ms. Cobban's book, The Palestinian Liberation Organization: People, Power, and Politics, published by Oxford University Press, won the Choice magazine award as an Outstanding Academic Book. In 1984 she received a Social Science Research Council-MacArthur Senior Fellowship in International Security. The result of this research is her latest book, The Superpowers and the Syrian-Israeli Conflict, to be published by the Center for Strategic and International Studies in early 1991. Cobban is currently a Scholar-in Residence at the Foundation for Middle East Peace in Washington, D.C. Barn 1, 8:15 p.m.
