Driving Licenses* applications

Additional names of applicants for ariving tests were presented to the Council for approval. It seems that the intermediate step of approving names in the Council before tests are taken is unnecessary and ineffective. The recommendation was accepted that this step be eliminated, and that the Central Committee report to the Council only after driving tests. The Council approved the names of applicants before accepted (see page 27) as well as those submitted this week, thich are Mancy Dodge and Pamela Tower.

Community Chest Budget: presentation to the Community

The question arose as to whether or not a meeting should be called for the presentation of the Budget to the Community. Higher contributions are to be encouraged.

Liquor Policy: report on decisions of last week

Since the Council accepted last week a recommendation to permittate service of light wines or beer in the Carriage Parn by groups other than those formally scheduled, a summary of the decision has been drawn up to be presented to the community. This was read by Dorothy Coffin and accepted by the Council. (see page 3) The student houses are included in the classification of "college organization" and accordingly may reserve the Carriage Barn for specific entertainments. The report of the Council decision is to be explained in house meetings this week, and the new policy will go into effect as soon as announced. The importance of a clear explanation of the Liquor Policy cannot be overstressed.

House Meetings

It was recommended that additional meetings be held to fully explain the Community Standards to the freshmen and to check up on the effectiveness of freshman meetings. Accommendations may be obtained in this way for the improvement of registration week next year. It was mentioned that there is a tendency for new members of the college to feel that no-one is interested in individuals on campus. In house meetings this week, there is an opportunity to emphasize the responsibility of freshmen to the community and the presence of real interest in their welfare.
