## JAPANESE LANTERN ERECTED TO HONOR JACK MOORE

A Japanese Lantern (Toro) has been placed in the Library Garden in honor and memory of Jack Moore, dance faculty member, who died in June, 1988. The Toro belonged to Jack and his friend Bob Van Cleave, the donor. Michael Rancourt installed the lantern. Stone lanterns have been in existence in Japan for over thirteen hundred years. Today there are more than two dozen distinctive designs and many of them derive their names from the types represented in their

respective temples. The custom of donating Toro to shrines and temples was most prominent in the Tokugawa Era (1603-1868) when princes and noblemen competed with one another in making these offerings. Later, stone lanterns were obtained from ruined shrines and temples by private parties, as well as by the public, and utilized as ornaments for their gardens. The lanterns increase in value according to age. Those covered with moss are most highly prized. This lantern is called the Kasuga style after the stone lanterns that line the approaches to the Kasuga Shrine in Nara, Japan. About 1700 or more of these have been donated by devotees of the shrine and once a year all are lighted with candles in honor of the dead.

## BENNINGTON COUNTY CHORAL SOCIETY TO PERFORM MOZART'S REQUIEM

The Bennington County Choral Society (BCCS) is presenting Mozart's Requiem as a celebration of the bicentennial of Vermont's statehood. The second concert of the BCCS's 1990-91 season will take place on Saturday, March 23, at 8:00 p.m., and Sunday, March 24, at 3:00 p.m., at Mount Anthony Union High School. The following soloists will be joining the chorus: Robin Lehleitner, soprano; Claudia Friedlander, alto; David Rivinus, tenor; and Mark Hull, bass. Tickets are \$6 for adults, \$4 for senior citizens and children. They are available from BCCS members and at the door.

Also, members of the public are warmly invited to join the Choral Society rehearsals for its upcoming spring concert, scheduled for June 22 and June 23. The concert will feature Vermont music written during the statehood period. Rehearsals begin Monday, April 1 at 7:30 p.m. and continue on successive Mondays in the music room at Mount Anthony Union High School. New members from the tri-state area are invited to join the Choral Society, no auditions necessary. Participants are encouraged to arrive early at the first rehearsal to allow time for signing in. Membership dues of \$5 will be collected to help defray some of the music and performance costs.

# BEYOND WAR TELEVISION SATELLITE MEETING

This meeting, on the theme, "Lessons of the Gulf War: Where Do We Go From Here?" will take place Saturday, March 23, at the Old First Church Barn, Monument Circle, Old Bennington, at 12:15 p.m. Facilitators will be State Senator Mary Ann Carlson and Kenneth Mayers, formerly of Bennington. The purpose of the meeting is to deepen understanding of the post-war Middle East and to help people clarify their role of ordinary citizens seeking, individually and collectively, ways to prevent future wars in the area.
