Memorandum To: Miss Stephens From: Mr. Leigh

I think we must be very sure that in carrying through the meat-saving program of the students and faculty every cent of money saved by not buying meat be turned over to the milk fund of the Red Cross. I think it is the spirit of the students' plan that we figure out what meat of the higher quality costs when served at a meal and then that we eliminate the meat in that meal. Since I am sure to have criticisms from the students or faculty as to the amount saved, I believe that Miss Jones and you should go over the actual meat costs of good meals for one month, including at least one chicken meal if you have it as often as once a month, and estimate the saving from that month's expense. In that way we could get an exact figure and the exact amount to be turned over to the Red Gross. I remember that you told me \$17 a week and that amounts to more than \$50 a month, which the students announced to be the saving.

Will there be any difficulty in proceeding as I suggested, by examining the actual bills? I should much prefer seeing these bills myself when Miss Jones and you have isolated them so that I may have first-hand information in dealing with such criticisms as are likely to arise.

In calculating the cost of meat at dinners I took the menus for one week, November 28th - December 4th, copies of which I have taken from my file and send herewith. They show as follows

These are actual figures, and from an unusually high week. Please notice that there is Roast Beef, Chicken and Duck, three expensive items which do not usually come in the same week. I explained to some of the group that the amount of \$12.50 was based on this average price, less the cost of the substitute. We gave Macaroni with cheese and two fresh vegetables on the meatless day.

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Memorandum To: Miss Stephens From: Mr. Leigh 12-14-32

As I understand it, what the students want to do is to cut out not the average meat meal but a beef steak or chicken meal each week. It seems to me that the thing to do, therefore, is to take your three meals at cost money, that is, the beef meal at \$24.00, the chicken meal at \$28.00, the roast duck costing \$21.42, and average them which would be \$24.00. Allowing \$4.00 for the substitute this makes a \$20.00 saving each week. It is a saving resulting specifically from eliminating the meat in what might be called a high quality meal.

In my talks with the students this is what they wanted to do. I would like to know about this as soon as possible so that we can get it actually under way and the money transmitted through Miss Jones to Miss Galusha.
