*WILLIAM KENNEDY

On Monday, May 13, Pulitzer Prize-wining novelist William Kennedy will read from his new novel *The Flaming Corsage*. Dramatic and fast-paced from start to finish, the novel concerns the troubled marriage between an ambitious playwright from Albany's working-class Irish neighborhood and his aristocratic wife, and a famous scandal that becomes the subject of the husband's major play. Kennedy began his writing career as a reporter and published his first novel, *The Ink Truck* in 1969. The *Flaming Corsage* is the sixth novel in his Albany Cycle, which also includes *Ironweed*, *Very Old Bones*, and *Quinn's Book*. *Upstairs Cafe*, 8 p.m.

*DR. DAVID H. SERLIN

On Monday, May 13, David Harley Serlin, New York University, will give an informal presentation entitled "The Most Talked About Girl in the World: Christine Jorgensen and Medical Discourse in the 1950s." The talk is part of a two-lecture series, Gender and Sexuality in Cold War America and is sponsored by the Social Sciences and David Waldstreicher's History of Sexuality class. Check with Health Service for exact hours. Doctor's appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment. For the spring term, Health Services will be closed every other Saturday and Sunday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Security can contact the nurse on call if needed during this time.

New listings:

The <u>Vermont Anti-Hunger Corps</u> (<u>VAHC</u>) is a program working to make nutritious, safe food available to Vermonters on a consistent basis through increasing utilization of existing public food programs, enhancing community and individual efforts to maximize community food resources, and reduce hunger. The program operates as a unique partnership between the U.S. Department of Agriculture, The Vermont Office of Economic Opportunity, AmeriCorps, and local anti-hunger groups. <u>VAHC</u> is now accepting applications for one year service positions that provide an annual living allowance, \$4,725 end of service education or training voucher award, basic health insurance, and other benefits. Deadline for receipt of application is June 21, 1996.

Project Warm Winter is a national service project co-sponsored by the Vermont Office of Economic Opportunity and Rutland Community Programs. The program is directed at assisting those on low incomes to keep warm through the Vermont winter through increasing community support for local fuel assistance efforts, finding ways to get free and low cost firewood to people who need it, helping to set up community networks to make sure isolated and housebound Vermonters are warm, and making energy efficiency and energy-related health and safety improvements and repairs for people unable to do this work themselves. Project Warm Winter is now accepting applications to enroll in six months of service, July through December, 1996. Benefits include living allowance, basic heath insurance, and \$2,363 education award voucher upon successful completion of service. Application deadline is June 1, 1996.

Vermont Department of Corrections. Two positions are available:

1. Pre-sentence investigations assistant to assist staff in conducting background investigations on defendants appearing in Vermont District Court. Responsibilities include research, interviewing, writing, and appearing in District Court to support the final written report. Writing and word processing skills are essential. Volunteers must be able to present a reasonably professional appearance when interacting with the public or the criminal justice system. Bennington Head Start.

1. Classroom/Activity Assistant. Assist Head Start teachers by bringing interests, talents, skills, and hobbies into the classroom--in music, puppetry, dance, drama, and intercultural games. This position also encompasses daily classroom routines (loading and unloading busses, meals, outdoor play, classroom supervision, and cleaning, all under a teacher's direction). No background experience or training required, only enthusiasm in sharing interests with young children.

2. Partnering. Become a familiar face to a child who needs some guidance in classroom social interactions by bringing the child into the activities of the group in appropriate ways. This includes language and behavior modeling, and building the child's self-esteem as part of the group. Background in psychology or child development required, as is experience with young children. Position involves some degree of physical activity, in indoor and

outdoor play.

3. Tutors for Parents. Either one-on-one, working on math or literacy education, or with small groups, particularly helping to prepare for upcoming examinations, such as for a Driver's Permit. Monday or Tuesday, from 10 a.m. - 12.noon.

4. Child Care. Caring for children while parents are attending small classes. Wednesday evenings, 6 - 8 p.m.

The North Bennington Graded School (K-6). The College has a continuing collaboration with the School, and there are several opportunities as classroom assistants.
