Plots should be ready for planting about the beginning of May. Please don't claim a plot if you won't be here to tend it. We try to keep the community garden free of herbicide use, and we avoid synthetic pesticides.

If you want to claim a plot (or if you have any questions), contact Kerry Woods, ext. 307, as soon as possible. Assignment will be first come first served (although if demand is high we may restrict the number of plots you can claim), and you may not get a plot if I receive your request after April 21. Close association with plants leads to longer and happier lives!
