Miss Thompson, widely known as political commentator and columnist of the New York Herald Tribune Syndicate, certainly needs no special introduction to a Bennington audience. However, it is of interest to recall that after doing graduate work at the University of Vienna, Miss Thompson worked as a speaker in up-state New York for the Woman's Suffrage campaign from 1915 to 1917. For three years after this she was engaged in social work, and from 1920-1928 was foreign correspondent for the Curtis-Martin Newspapers, Inc. (the Philadelphia Public Ledger and the New York Evening Post). For the first four years she was stationed in Vienna, and for the latter four was Chief of the Central European Service, stationed in Berlin. Miss Thompson is giving her lecture no specific title, but is expected to make some remarks on her recent trip to England.

The Monday afternoon Tecture by Mr. Brooks, Associate Professor of English at Vassar, is designed especially for students in Introduction to Literature but is open to the Community.

Community Chest Drive

The Community Chest opened its Fall Drive on October 1. The goal for this drive is \$1,250. The budget is the same as it has been in the past two years.

To date we have received \$771.38 or approximately 61% of the total goal. 220 students have contributed, nearly 79% of the student body. 13 faculty and staff members have contributed, or about 21%.

From the Cooperative Store

Store Bills: The Cooperative Store wishes to remind students of the regulations regarding Store cills established by the Board of Directors of the Cooperative Store in May, 1940:

1. At no time should students permit their Store cills to exceed \$5.00

2. On the 7th and 21st of each month two black lists should be posted. The names of students owing bills between \$5.00 and \$10.00 will appear on the first black list. These students will be requested to pay cash for all future purchases until their bills are paid in full. On the second black list the names of students owing more than \$10.00 will be posted. These students will also be requested not to charge any future purchases and, in addition, they will be fined 10 cents per day until their bills are paid in full.

The first black lists of the semes ter will be posted on Tuesday, October

21st.

The Board of Directors of the Rebates: Cooperative Store has voted to issue a 4% rebate on purchases made by members during the year 1940-41. Store members will receive their rebate chocks sometime before October 25th.
