The Community is invited to hear Dr. Tooi Choomsai at an open meeting of the Comparative Religion class, Canfield Livingroom, next Sunday, November 20th, at 5:30 p.m. Dr. Choomsai, visiting Professor at Cornell University, comes from Thailand as Professor of Psychology at Chulalongkorn University and as Senior Research Advisor to the National Economic Council. He is also Professor and one of the founders of the new Buddhist University for bringing new learning to the Priesthood.
