UPCOMING EVENTS

*WISG MONDAY NIGHT VIDEO FESTIVAL

The Women's Issues Study Group will hold a three-part, three-month video festival during the spring term to examine women's history, sexual diversity, and women in the arts. The first film of the second part—"Breaking Down Walls: Celebrating Sexual Diversity"—will be shown on Monday, April 4 at 9:00 p.m. in the Upstairs Café. Forbidden Love is a film by A. Weissman and L. Fernie, 1992. Compelling, often hilarious, and always rebellious, the 10 women interviewed in this film paint a portrait of lesbian sexuality and survival during the sexual dark ages of the 1950s and 60s. Against a backdrop of book covers from lesbian pulp novels, tabloid headlines, and archival photographs and film clips, these women recount stories about living and loving in their clandestine world.

"USDAN EXHIBITS: "À LA PINTURA"/"ART "A LA PINTURA"/"ART

"À la Pintura: Artist's Books by Robert Motherwell" highlights the series of 24 large-scale prints and text by that title produced by the artist at Universal Limited Art Editions between 1968 and 1972. The English translation of Alberti, which inspired Motherwell,

was the work of Bennington poet and translator Ben Belitt. Belitt is the owner of the prints. "Art and Invention" focuses on the career of George A. C. Holt, faculty member at Bennington from 1941-1968, and will show representative portions of Holt's work, as well as attempt to convey some of the excitement of the workshop and studio in which he was most at home. Ajoint opening for both exhibitions will be held on April 5, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in Usdan Gallery. The exhibitions run through April 26.

*LECTURE BY JIBRIN IBRAHIM

On Tuesday, April 5, the Literature and Languages Division will sponsor a lecture by Jibrin Ibrahim, on "Creative Writing and Political Analysis: The Case of Chinua Achebe." Dr. Ibrahim teaches political science at Ahmadu Bello University in Zaria, Nigeria and is spending this semester at the University of Toronto. His lecture will be about Chinua Achebe, Nigeria's best-known novelist. Barn One, 8:15 p.m.

*PAUL AARON LECTURE

Alumnus Paul Aaron, director, producer, and screenwriter, will give a talk about screenwriting on Wednesday, April 6, at 7:00 p.m. in Barn One. Directing films on the West Coast and plays on and off-Broadway, Aaron's credits include the film A Different Story, starring Meg Foster and Perry King; off-Broadway rock-musical hit Salvation, featuring Bette Midler; film The Tenth Man, starring Richard Dreyfuss, for which he was awarded the Los Angeles Drama Critic's Award as best director of the year; film The Miracle Worker, starring Patty Duke and Melissa Gilbert; among many others. For the past two years his concentration has been on writing and producing for television.

HEALTH SERVICE HOURS AND INFORMATION

Health Service is open daily from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m., with a nurse on duty. Weekend hours are Friday, 11 p.m. through Sunday, 11 p.m. On Saturday and Sunday between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., the door is locked. Please knock on the door if a nurse is needed. In the event of an emergency when Health Service is closed, call emergency extension 210. A college physician is available Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for clinic hours. Check with Health Service for exact hours. Doctor appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment. Students who need to be seen by a doctor when the Health Service physician is not in attendance should contact the nurse on duty during Health Service hours or call emergency ext. 210 when Health Service is closed. A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance.

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
