Mr. Crowther, a British economist visiting this country as a member of the British Board of Trade, has been on the staff of the Economist since 1932, and its editor since 1938. received his education at Leeds Grammar School and at Clare College, Cambridge, with advance work at Yale and Columbia. He held a Commonwealth Fund Fellowship from 1929 to 1931; did investment banking in New York and Lon don in 1931-32, and in 1932 acted as special adviser to the Irish Banks Standing Committee. His writings include An Introduction to the Study of Prices; Ways and Means, and Economics for Democrats.

Mr. Feeley has been appointed Chairman of the Art Division.

Mr. Ozenfant, besides being very widely known as a painter, is considered one of the outstanding theoreticians in the field of modern art. has had his own school in Paris and in London, has lectured in the New School for Social Research in New York and at Cooper Union, and now has the Ozenfant School of Fine Arts in New York, "In 1915, he founded the revue L'Elan, the aim of which was to connect, in the absence of other revues (they were suspended during the wat), the artists and writers with Paris and between them-He was about the only person to openly maintain the avant-garde spirit during the war. He began his work as a theorist in this journal. He fought for the avant-garde and against the exaggerations of the movement that were killing much art." For many years he worked closely with Le Corbusier. Together they wrote After Cubism, and for five years published L'Esprit Nouveau, which enjoyed a wide circulation in artistic circles in France and abroad. His most important work, Foundations of Modern Art, was published in 1928 (1931 in the United States).

Dr. Johnson, a Canadian by birth, is a graduate of Albion College in Michigan and of Union Theological Seminary. He has served as pastor of several Methodist churches in New York and BENNINGTON COLLSinge 1924 has been executive secre-(continued on page 3)
