Sarah Schulman

Conflict Is Not Abuse

Novelist, essayist, playwright, and distinguished scholar Sarah Schulman offers an eye-opening and original perspective on the cultural phenomenon of blame and scapegoating, as explored in her acclaimed work, Conflict Is Not Abuse: Overstating Harm, Community Responsibility and the Duty of Repair.

Schulman asks us to think critically about our proclivity for choosing blame over personal accountability. From intimate relationships to police violence to geopolitical conflicts, Schulman argues, our tendency to blame those who are different from us rather than reflect on our own actions results in injustice, exclusion, dehumanization, and enhances the power of the State. Poet Claudia Rankine wrote, "It's impossible to be invested in the world and not be invested in this groundbreaking and challenging book."

Dr. Janoff-Bulman is a world-renowned political psychologist and the head of the graduate psychology program at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst. Janoff-Bulman's research on victimization and trauma led to the groundbreaking book Shattered Assumptions: Towards a New Psychology of Trauma (1992). In recent years, Janoff-Bulman's studies have focused on morality, particularly the motivational bases of different moral perspectives and the implications for an individual's political ideology. Her research won the prestigious Morton Deutsch Award and the Aaron T. Back award.

Dr. Giovanna Di Chiro is the Lang Professor for Issues of Social Change at Swarthmore College. She teaches interdisciplinary courses in environmental studies and women's and gender studies, and incorporates a community-based action research emphasis. Di Chiro is the author of the book Embodied Ecologies: Science, Politics, and Environmental Justice.
