Series Meetings for Spring Semester

The General Meetings Committee has arranged for spring semester a series concerned with the fundamental values now at stake for American society and for the individual from the viewpoint, first of the anthropologist, and second of the analytical psychologist. The series will be presented by:

Dr. Ralph Linton, Professor of Anthropology, Columbia University.

Dr. Erich Fromm, Lecturer and Author in Applied Psychoanalytic Theory, New York City.

The series will be held during the weeks of March 9 and 16th, each speaker presenting two lectures and a seminar. Dr. Linton will open the series.
