Mr. Troy was an influential member of the generation of critics including I.A. Richards, William Empson, Kenneth Burke and Richard Blackmur. His critical essays on Thomas Mann, Virginia Woolf, D. H. Lawrence, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Valery Proust, Balzac, Stendhal, Henry James and James Joyce have been widely anthologized.

Stanley Edgar Hyman, who will speak that evening, says of them "...
they invariably stood out; it did not matter who had written on the subject,
Troy's piece was always the best." Other topics Mr. Troy dealth with include:
"Time and Space Conceptions in Modern Literature," "A Note on Myth," and
"Thoughts on Tragedy," all available in the recently published edition of
Mr. Troy's "Selected Essays." (Rutgers University Press, 1967) During the
1930's William Troy was a regular reviewer of fiction for The Nation, and also
served as film critic for that weekly. During that decade and the next his
critical essays appeared frequently in The Hudson Review and the Partisan
Review and in many other journals and quarterlies.
