

EXPRESSIONISM AND "THE ADDING MACHINE"

Expressionism is a "formal expression" of the artist's emotion. It is a means toward projecting a more poignant reality through subjective rather than objective perception. Realistic pictorial environment and probability of events are unimportant. It does not bother with the accidental informality of external actuality except in so far as it reveals pertinent reality. In expressionistic drama the characters use dialogue too intense to be addressed to one another but rather primarily to the comprehension of the audience.

"The Adding Machine" is a satiric comedy built on this plan. The last three scenes are even more expressionistic than the first four since they are Rice's method of commenting on contemporary human ideas through fantastic comedy.

There is an exhibition of expressionism in other art media in the studio at the right of the auditorium.
