NEW NILE ORCHESTRA

Bennington College will present the New Nile Orchestra. The Orchestra, founded in 1991 by Kiflu Kidane, combines singing in the ancient Ethiopian tongues of Amharic and Geez with modern electric guitar, bass, keyboard, percussion, and drum set. They have performed at jazz and reggae festivals, colleges, and clubs across the Northeast. The Vermont Times called the Orchestra's "shaking dance rhythms, snappy percussion, and punchy horns (an) exciting backdrop to Kidane's delicate singing and artful dancing." SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY TO STUDY ABROAD

The National Security Education Program (NSEP) awards scholarships to American undergraduates to study in regions outside of Western Europe, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. NSEP scholarship awards are available for a maximum of \$8,000 per semester or \$16,000 per academic year.
