ART GALLERY EXHIBIT

About his background, Mr. Gordin says, "Born in Russia on October 24th, 1918. Lived in Shanghai, China until the age of four when the family migrated to the United States. Put up with Brooklyn (and vice-versa) until I discovered New York (and the Village) through Cooper Union in the late 1930's. Graduated from Cooper and worked at stage design, drafting, cartooning, a bit of teaching while doing my own work."

RUMMAGE SALE - Terms and Regulations

- 1) Any portable article, such as clothes, records, books, etc. may be submitted. No large piece of furniture will be accepted.
- 2) Articles should be brought to the Student Lounge between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on the evening of June 13th. No articles will be accepted at any other time. The Store Board will not be responsible for articles left in the Store at any other time.
- 3) Articles must be tagged with the tags provided on the Store counter. On each tag must be clearly written the name of the owner, description of the article and its price. Tags must be secured to each article.
- 4) All sales are strictly cash. Nothing may leave the sale until it is paid for.
- 5) Nothing will be sold before 8:00 a.m. nor after 5:30 p.m.
- 6) Owners must call for all unsold articles before 6:00 p.m. on June 14th.
- 7) Articles not collected by the owners and not sold in the Rummage Sale will be given to a charity designated by the Store Board.
- 8) For articles sold, owners will receive 65% of the salling price, 25% will be given to the Scholarship Fund and 10% will be retained by the Store.
- 9) All articles which are in the Lost and Found cabinet or in the safe at 6:30 p.m. on June 13th will be removed, priced and put in the Rummage Sale.
