

1. All guests should report at the Commons and give their names to the telephone operator who will announce them to the girl they wish to see.
2. Anyone expecting a guest after 11:00 p.m. must give a slip bearing her name and that of the expected guest to the policeman.
3. All students are held strictly responsible for the conduct of friends who are visiting on the campus.
Students are expected to call on the night policeman to remove objectionable friends in cases of their misconduct and on the following day to report the matter to some member of the Student Council.
A girl on answering her house door bell is responsible for whomever she allows to enter until she finds their real hostess.
4. It seems wise that guests should not be entertained in the houses until late hours.
5. Students should not climb in windows when returning to College after the doors are locked.
6. Students should not unlock the doors of the houses after the watchman has locked them at night.
7. The quiet hour in the Commons on Saturday nights is 12:00 o'clock.
8. Shorts and other scanty apparel should not be worn into Bennington or other conspicuous places.
9. Sun bathing should be restricted to the further side of McCullough House. Bathing suits and kerchiefs should be used only for this purpose.
10. There are prowlers on the campus which makes sleeping out dangerous.
11. College material should not be used for sleeping out over night. Any student so doing will be fined five dollars.
12. In regard to out-of-town slips--any changes whatsoever in plans must be wired to a College official.
13. If a student is sleeping in another house she should leave a slip on her door to that effect.
14. Evening Meetings:
No one is allowed to enter after the speaker has begun.
There should be no smoking or knitting until the question period.
More consideration should be shown in playing the victrola during evening meetings.
The piano in the lounge must not be sat upon during evening meetings or at any other time.
15. Library:
Students should not sit on the window sills or lie on the floor in the library.

A person who has taken a book from the library should not pass it on to others, but return it first to the library. The number of books taken by one individual should be limited. If it is necessary to take several on one subject they should be returned as soon as possible. When reserved books are left at the library door before nine o'clock, they should be put on the bench and not on the floor.

16. The kitchen in the Commons is not to be used after hours by students or faculty.

17. Students should let Miss Hait know ahead of time if they are planning to have a guest for a meal.

18. The piano in Dewey House is to be used for lessons only.

19. It is the duty of every member of the Community to attend House and Community Meetings.

20. Signing-out:

If a student is to be off campus after 11:00 p.m. she must sign out in the book in the Commons, putting her name and specific destination, if possible. On her return she must sign her name and the time she comes in in the policeman's book.

Students must sign out if they intend to be away after 11 even if just going for a walk.

21. Drinking:

Any excessive drinking on this campus or any other place will be subject to its investigation and action.

Because of the College reputation it asks girls not to go to speakeasies.

The Council feels that drinking in fraternities, in going to students' rooms at Williams and in going to speakeasies, girls subject themselves to harsh public opinion and in some cases to action by the Council.

Until there has been more consideration given the question there is to be no wine used in the dining rooms.

22. No Bennington girls shall go upstairs in any Williams fraternity or dormitory after dinner.

Information regarding regulations at Williams:

1. Dancing at night in a fraternity house is a violation of the Williams' Student Council ruling.
2. It is against the regulations of some and custom of other houses to have girls return to the fraternities after the movies, etc.
3. Dormitories should not be entered.

In letter to the chairman of the Williams' Student Council:

We understand that you will report any cases in which our students are at fault and we shall continue to take corresponding action.
