

XV. PROCESSIONAL

A Celebration Service is a spiritually inspired performance piece created by Meredith Monk, internationally acclaimed composer, singer, choregrapher, stage and film director, and pioneer in what is now called "extended vocal technique" and "interdisciplinary performance". The work uses her musical compositions, movement and texts compiled in collaboration with Pablo Velo, from worldwide spiritual traditions, to create a contemporary ritual, which celebrates the larger community of people and the power of the human spirit. The event is directed by longtime member of Monk's Vocal Ensemble and the Bennington faculty, Tom Bogdan. The choreography was restaged by Allison Easter, another member of Monk's Vocal Ensemble and supervised by faculty member Terry creach.

In 1996, the Union Theological Seminary asked me to create a worship service for a conference of the American guild of Organists. There were strictures on what form it could take. I decided that I wanted to make a non-sectarian service utilizing texts from spiritual traditions worldwide as well as a variety of choral and organ works from my repertoire.

For many years I had been contemplating how I would create sacred space within a performance context. With A Celebration Service I was able to make a form that broke down the boundaries between performance and service, audience and congregation. We performed it twice in June 1996 at the Union Theological Seminary at noon. The service became a lunchtime respite for all of the participants in the midst of a noisy and busy city.

Since that time, we have performed A Celebration Service in several cities in the USA. Because the service seemed to offer an uplifting experience wherever we went my dream became to have people from all over the world perform it. My dear friend and colleague, Tom Bogdan, made this dream come true, mounting productions in Bennington, Vermont, Budapest, Hungary, Boulder, Colorado, Sao Paulo, Brazil, Syracuse, New York and Manila, Philippines. Allison Easter taught the choreography in each of these locations. I am deeply grateful for the cast and production team of Bennington College for once again allowing the life of A Celebration Service to continue. - Meredith Monk



MEREDITH MONK is a composer, singer, director/choreographer and creator of new opera, music-theatre works, films and installations. A pioneer in what is now called "extended vocal technique" and

"interdisciplinary performance" Monk creates works that thrive at the intersection of music and movement, image and object, light and sound in an effort to discover and weave together new modes of perception. Her groundbreaking exploration of the voice as an instrument, as an eloquent language in and of itself, expands the boundaries of musical composition, creating landscapes of sound that unearth feelings, energies and memories for which there are no words. Over the last five decades, she has been hailed as "a magician of the voice" and "one of America's coolest composers". Celebrated internationally, Monk's work has been presented by BAM, Lincoln Center Festival, Houston Grand Opera, London's Barbican Centre, and at major venues in countries from Brazil to Syria. Among her many accolades, she was recently named an Officer of the Order of Arts and Letters by the Republic of France, recipient of New Music USA's 2013 Founders Award, the 2012 Composer of the Year by Musical America and one of NPR's 50 Great Voices, and received a 2012 Doris Duke Artist Award and a 2011 Yoko Ono Lennon Courage Award for the Arts. Meredith was chosen a Composer in Residence at Carnegie Hall 2014-2015. President Obama awarded her The National Medal of Arts on September 10, 2015.

We could not perform Meredith Monk's A Celebration Service without the combined efforts of everyone in our Bennington College community. The administration, staff, faculty and students come together with our individual services and gifts to support and facilitate the rich lives and endeavors that we have on this beautiful campus. We celebrate each other in doing so.

I'd like to express special thanks to all of our colleagues in music, dance and drama who open new possibilities of exploration, creativity and expression for our students. You enrich the lives of everyone in our community by making the creation of many productions like A Celebration Service to happen.
