*ROBERT H. WOODWORTH LECTURESHIP SERIES

On Monday, November 21, noted physicist Freeman Dyson will present a seminar entitled *New Directions in Applied Science*, Dickinson 148 at 2 p.m., and a lecture entitled *The Scientist as Rebel*, Barn 1 at 8 p.m. Dyson is currently professor emeritus of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University. One of the founders of quantum electrodynamics, Dyson helped design the first commercial nuclear reactor, was one of the chief designers of the Orion spaceship (which used atomic bombs for its propulsion), and is known for his speculations about the far future. He recently received the Fermi Medal, one of the country's highest scientific honors.
