First Lecture on "Humanism and the Modern World". Speaker will be George DeSantillana. Title will be "The Renaissance".

The lecture series entitled "Humanism and the Modern World" will be opened this Thursday evening, March. 20, by Professor George Diaz DeSantillana, who will speak on "The Renaissance".

Professor DeSantillana received the degree of Doctor of Sciences from the University of Rome, where he was cofounder of the Institute for the History of Science in the University, He has also been professor at the New School for Social Research and at Harvard University, his special field being the history and philosophy of science. He was an associate of the Institute for the History of Science at the University of Paris and has also been a lecturer there.

With Federico Enriques he is coauthor of Storia del Pensiero Scientifico (Antiquita), a work which will shortly appear in English and Spanish translations. Professor DeSantillana is also the author of Compendio della Storia del Pensiero Scientifico, and of a book entitled The Development of Scientific Rationalism, to appear under the auspices of the International Encyclopedia of United Science of the University of Chicago, He is a contributor to Isis Thales and other learned journals.
