## Program Notes...

At the time of the writing of *Viola Sonata #1*, *Memoirs of Departure*, January and February 1996, I was trying to understand my motivations for a trip I knew I needed to take, a thousand mile walking journey across Europe. I suppose I felt a need to understand history and feel myself a part of it or perhaps, I was becoming aware for the first time of my mortality. During the course of this journey it became clear: Medieval vagabond sons have become modern wanderers meeting at the timeless river.

When I received the John Hendrick Commission, my first plan was to write a cantata of some sort trying to come to grips with these ideas and understand why I needed to leave. Tobias Picker suggested I write a viola sonata. I became intrigued with this idea and began thinking of the viola's rich tone and how appropriate it was for the ideas that were bothering me.

Metaphorically, it is a meditation on leavetaking.

Constructionally, it is a meditation on threes and the idea of making rhythmic time exist and at the same time, not. It is in three movements, starting quickly and gradually asking time to disappear.
