BENNINGTON COLLEGE - BENNINGTON. VERMONT.

Bennington, Vermont - September 17 - Sir Norman Angell of Great Britain,
Dr. Karl Polanyi formerly of Hungary, and Dr. Richard Goets of Vienna have been
appointed as Resident Lecturers for the first semester at Bennington College. The
appointment of these lecturers is a part of a plan to adjust the College to the
national and international situation and to use its resources wherever possible
to aid those who are the victims of the present war in Burope. The lectureships
are made possible by the diverting of funds normally used for the procuring of
outside speakers, musicians, etc. into a special fund for honorary scholarships.
Each of these men will deliver a series of lectures during their stay and will also
hold informal conferences. They are urged to continue in whatever research and
private work they may be engaged upon, and may enter into the informal life of
the community as much or as little as they wish.

Sir Normal Angell - Nobel prize winner in 1933, author of "The Great Illusion", and tireless worker for international peace and good will, needs no further introduction. He will be at Bennington for only a portion of the term, and will give a series of three lectures on the following topics: 1) The Ethics of Resistance to Violence, 2) The Place of Force in the Maintenance of Peace, and 3) Where Education has Failed and Why in relation War and Peace. Dr. Colanyi, University Extension Lecturer at Oxford University and the University of London, is in this country under the auspices of the Institute of International Education. He was formerly a lecturer at the Peoples' College in Vienna, a member of the Budapest Bar, and an editor of Der Oesterreichische Volkswirt. He is at present an editor of Christianity and the Social Revolution. The general topic of the series of five lectures to be given by Dr. Polanyi will be The Present Age of Transition, and will discuss Mazism, Marxism and the democratic alternative. Dr. Goetz is a successful Austrian author and critic. He is a specialist in medieval history as well as the arts, and his plays, verse and dramatic criticism were well-known in Austria. He will lecture at Bennington on the European Drama.
