*BERNARD MALAMUD

Bennington College will host a memorial event entitled "Remembering 'Bern' Malamud at Bennington, 1961-1986." The life and works of celebrated author Bernard Malamud will be honored in a panel discussion of his wide-ranging influence and enduring legacy by Alan Cheuse, Nick DelBanco, and Laura Furman with introduction by Carlin Romano. Malamud, whose works include The Fixer, The Natural, and The Assistant, taught at Bennington from 1961-1986. A Pulitzer Prize winner and recipient of two National Book Awards, Malamud is widely recognized as one of the most important American authors of his generation. Cheuse and Delbanco, co-editors of a new book on Malamud, Talking Horse, Bernard Malamud on Life and Work, were close friends and colleagues of Malamud and both formerly on the Bennington faculty. Laura Furman '68, former Malamud student and current faculty member at the Unversity of Texas, has been awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship for her fiction. *ARNOLD ZIMMERMAN

On Tuesday, March 26, Bennington College will present Arnold Zimmerman. Zimmerman, a graduate from the Kansas City Art Institute with an MFA from Alfred University, will speak about his own work. He has produced large scale, heavily incised vessels. Other works feature hats and shoes, wheels and common tools appearing alongside shells, plant forms, body parts, and ambiguous abstractions. These are carved into clay mixed with sand to create a rough, tactile surface that further emphasizes their corporeal character. A trip to the hospital emergency room without prior approval may not be covered by school insurance. A college physician is available Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for clinic hours. Check with Health Service for exact hours. Doctor's appointments should be arranged either through the nurse on duty or the Health Service secretary. Students who miss a doctor's appointment without prior notice will be charged \$10 for that missed appointment. For the spring term, Health Services will be closed every other Saturday and Sunday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Security can contact the nurse on call if needed during this time.

New listings:

Southern Vermont College is looking for a student with experience and expertise in computer graphics to assist it in preparing the SVC WWW Home Page. Interested students should contact Susan O'Neill at 442-5427.

The College has been working for several months now with the <u>Retired Senior Volunteer Program</u> (RSVP) in Bennington to develop a resource center containing information on volunteer opportunities in Bennington County. One aspect of the Center will be CARENET, a local network through which any citizen of the community (including Bennington College students) interested in volunteering would have access to a database containing this information. RSVP is looking for a student with sufficient computer expertise to assist in the initial implementation and the regular updating of CARENET. The <u>Red Brick Head Start in Shaftsbury</u> is looking for a classroom assistant, particularly on Tuesdays. The class is a small one (nine students), but many of the children need one-on-one supervision. Bennington students can also help plan visits by Head Start classes to campus. <u>The Tutorial Center</u> in Bennington welcomes suggestions from students interested in presenting their own work to classes. This might include, but need not be restricted to, readings, discussions, exhibitions, and performances.

Continuing listings:

The Everett Public Service Internship Program provides \$175 in weekly expenses to students selected as interns to work at one of 44 participating organizations. Organizations for summer, 1996 include: Advocates for Children (Queens, NY), Alliance for Justice (Washington, DC), Brooklyn Children's Museum, Center for Science in the Public Interest (Washington), Facing History and Ourselves (Brookline, MA), Human Rights Watch, Museum of Modern Art (New York City), National Public Radio (Washington), Native American Rights Fund (Boulder, CO), NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund (New York City), Physicians for Social Responsibility (Washington, DC), Shorebank Corporation (Chicago), Tobacco Products Liability Project (Boston). Both undergraduate and graduate students are eligible to apply. More information is available in Barn 80.

Vermont Department of Corrections. Two positions are available:

 Pre-sentence investigations assistant to assist staff in conducting background investigations on defendants appearing in Vermont District Court. Responsibilities include research, interviewing, writing, and appearing in District Court to support the final written report. Writing and word processing skills are essential. Volunteers must be able to present a reasonably professional appearance when interacting with the public or the criminal justice system. Activities are performed at the State Office Complex (in the town of Bennington) and at various locations in Bennington County.

2. Assistant to supervisor of mandated community service teams. For more information about either position, contact Tom Freeman at 447-2777.

<u>PAVE (Project Against Violent Encounters)</u> needs advocates to serve in several capacities: hot line worker, court advocate, safe-home provider or community educator. No prior experience or particular skills required. Training provided.

Bennington Head Start.

- 1. <u>Classroom/Activity Assistant</u>. Assist Head Start teachers by bringing interests, talents, skills, and hobbies into the classroom--in music, puppetry, dance, drama, and intercultural games. This position also encompasses daily classroom routines (loading and unloading busses, meals, outdoor play, classroom supervision, and cleaning, all under a teacher's direction). No background experience or training required, only enthusiasm in sharing interests with young children.
- 2. Partnering. Become a familiar face to a child who needs some guidance in class-room social interactions by bringing the child into the activities of the group in appropriate ways. This includes language and behavior modeling, and building the child's self-esteem as part of the group. Background in psychology or child development required, as is experience with young children. Position involves some degree of physical activity, in indoor and outdoor play.
- 3. <u>Tutors for Parents</u>. Either one-on-one, working on math or literacy education, or with small groups, particularly helping to prepare for upcoming examinatins, such as for a driver's permit. Monday or Tuesday, from 10 a.m. -12 noon.
- 4. <u>Child Care</u>. Caring for children while parents are attending small classes. Wednesday evenings, 6 8 p.m.

The North Bennington Graded School (K-6). The College has a continuing collaboration with the school, and there are several opportunities as classroom assistants.

<u>Prospect Nursing Home</u>. Volunteers to assist Activity Director in planned therapeutic activities for residents. Activities normally scheduled for periods of 1/2 or 1 hour during the day, as well as evenings and weekends.
