*AN EVENING OF NEW AMERICAN MUSIC

The Music Division offers a program of new American compositions featuring bass and computer/electronic percussion. The concert features guest artist Amy Knoles, percussionist, and Robert Black, bassist. The program includes works for solo drum, solo bass, and combinations of bass and the K.A.T. MIDI mallet, which resembles a marimba with rubber pads capable of triggering all of the sounds known to the electronic music world. Amy Knoles is a founding member of the California E.A.R. Unit, currently in residence at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. She has worked closely with composers such as Pierre Boulez, John Cage, Elliot Carter, Henry Brant, and Steve Reich, and has recently been working in the realm of creating electronic musical environments for works of art in galleries. Bassist Robert Black regularly presents solo concerts throughout the United States and Europe, and his work with composers has resulted in over 30 commissioned works, including pieces by John Cage, Paul Dresher, and James Sellars. He performs with the electro-acoustic performance group Iron Cow, the trio Hyperion, and the electric string trio Hot Vibrato. *"AVANT-GARDE FILM DESIGN VS. MODERN ARCHITECTURE"

The Divisions of Visual Arts and Literature and Languages present a lecture by Helmut Weihsmann, who teaches at the Academy for Applied Arts in Vienna. The Viennese historian and theoretican Helmut Weihsmann has been investigating the psychological effects of form and space in film sets. He will describe the spatial characteristics of fantastic and expressionistic cinema in his lecture. Expressionist films were produced without exception in the artificial atmosphere of the film studio, thus excluding all unpredictable factors and allowing only that which was fundamental for the creation of an illusion or fantastic image, and also which was psychological relevant to the artist's expression. The significance of this important, but astonishingly poorly documented invention or phenonmen in progressive film design, is traditionally underrated. Film decorators and architects, who happen to collaborate with the cinema, have long been forgotten or miscredited or considered a "quantité négligeable" in the histories of the modern art and architecture movement. Mr. Weihsmann will correct this shortcoming, but his survey stands as an introduction to virtually unexplored terrain. Barn 1, 8:30 p.m.
